THE MANDATE OF THE CENTRE






ACTIVATION OF WOMEN DEVELOPMENT CENTRES (WDCs)

The ultimate goal of empowering women through Women Development Centres is poverty reduction. The Activation of Women **Development Centres is focused** on poverty reduction at the household level, as grassroots women experience poverty in the household, where they spend most of their time.



Women Development Centres had been established throughout the 774 Local Government Areas during the 1980s and 1990s under the Better Life Programme initiated by late Dr. (Mrs.) Maryam Babangida ,for the purpose of achieving women empowerment and poverty reduction at the grassroots, through vocational training and basic literacy.





It is in recognition of this that the National Centre for Women Development went into collaboration with the Japanese International Co-operation Agency (JICA) to run a pilot activation programme in Kano State in 2007. This project was carried out in 6 selected Women Development Centres, at the Local Government level.

In January 2010, the NCWD successfully concluded this pilot phase by reactivating the 6 nos. Women Development Centres, in Dambatta, Gwale, Bichi, Gaya, Kumbotso and Gezawa Local Government Areas of Kano State.

Development, Validation And Distribution of Guidelines for Activation of Women Development Centres

In the course of the execution of the NCWD/JICA Women Development Centre activation project, the National Council on Women Affairs mandated the NCWD to develop Guidelines for the Activation of Women Development Centres, nationwide. NCWD took up the challenge and at three (3) fora with stakeholders, drawn from 36 States and the FCT, was able to develop the document which was validated by Stakeholders in January, 2010.

The Guidelines have been published and circulated in January 2010 to all States and Local Governments of the Federation, the Federal Ministry of Women Affairs and Social Development, National Assembly, the Millennium Development Goals Office and the Presidency.

These Guidelines are intended to provide an appropriate working document for any State or Local Government that might want to reactivate existing non functional Women Development Centres.¹⁵

Activation of Women Development Centres Phase II

Based on the success of the 1st phase, NCWD/JICA extended the activation to six States namely Anambra, Cross River, Kaduna, Kano, Kwara and Niger where 3 Women Development Centre's (WDCs) were activated in each of the States as a trial/model. This Women Development Centre's Activation Project Phase II has rounded up in February 2015.





One of the outcomes of the project is the development and dissemination of a Practical Manual to enhance the functions of WDCs nationwide to enable them achieve the purposes of improving the livelihood of women in the rural areas and to build their capacities to learn vocational skills in order to earn income and support their families and communities.

In the course of implementation of the Women Development Centres (WDC) activation project, the need to have an advanced training practical manuals to enhance the process of the activation became imperative; in the light of higher demand for women empowerment and the need to standardize the WDCs to provide skill acquisition training and improve the livelihood of women at the grassroots. To achieve this, the Project developed and produced three sets of practical manuals in the most simplified manner to assists the NCWD, the States ministries of Women Affairs and Social Development (SMWA&SD) and Women Development Officers (WDO) at the WDC and to serve as guides in the implementation of the project objectives nationwide.

The manuals have been distributed to various stakeholders.

- 1. Baseline Survey
- 2. Workshop on WDC services and action plan
- 3. Skill up training for WDC instructors
- 4. Management training in English and Hausa
- 5. Impact Assessment Survey
- 6. Evaluation on Management training
- 7. Distribution of materials and equipment to the WDCs.



NCWD ACTIVATION PROJECT

 In 2019 we are moving to six additional States and are looking for collaborators to expand from 3 WDCs in each state to 6.

- To expose participant on the use of Office Packages and its uses, so as to increase efficiency in everyday activities and to foster entrepreneurship development.
- To sensitize the participant on the use of internet and mobile technology for communication, information search and retrieval





- The programme was designed in recognition Of the changing needs of women and young girls from the traditional vocational programmes to the male dominated sphere to make them truly self-reliant after the completion of the project. It aimed at
- Exposing women to attain a breakthrough in a non-traditional trade;
- Empower women in carrying out basic maintenance and installation work; and
- Become agents of change in their respective communities.



- To date a total of 240 young women and girls ages 15 – 35 have been trained in the last three years in the following skills
- Refrigerator and Air Conditioning work, Plant & Generator Repairs, Plumbing and Pipe Fitting, and Tiling & Masonry
- The 240 graduates were given Trade Test 3 Certification from the Federal Ministry of Labour to enable them gain employment





- We intend introducing other skills such as
- PoP,
- Carpentry,
- furniture making,
- automobile repairs etc.
- Livestock farming
- Gardening

- A key challenge with the program is that we are currently utilizing the basement of the guest as the workshop. However, there is available land by the Auditorium for the construction of the Laboratory for training.
- We also intend to introduce the Artisanship into the WDCs Activation Project in the States for direct impact on the rural economic development and women's empowerment





AMERICAN CORNER

THE NIGERIAN WOMEN HALL OF FAME

The Nigerian Women Hall of Fame is one of the visual forms of documentation and consists of archival materials on Women Achievers. The Hall is established to specifically pay tribute to Nigerian Women through the ages in all sectors of the economy and human endeavour. The Hall provides role models for younger girls and the society at large on the unlimited potentials of women in the Nigerian Society. The Hall currently features a comprehensive display on women in the form of pictures, plagues, busts, artifacts and memorabilia. It also features records of women in pre-colonial days, who played legendary roles in trade, politics, commerce and inter-tribal wars but had not been acknowledged nor given prominence in national records.
